Just about everybody was hustling over Washington's long weekend, including the wrestling team. They posted their second straight win this season, bringing their overall record to 2-6. As shown by their record they have been continuously improving. This has been brought about by the hard work put out by the entire squad throughout this season. Senior 177 pounder. Al Pfeltz has led the team in this department, and has been one of the outstanding wrestlers this season. Al spent part of his Christmas leave at the Wilkes-Barre, Penn, tourney where he took fourth place against competition considered by many to be second only to that encountered in the NCAA's. Four other wrestlers have shown especially well this year. At 123 Doug Holmes (Jr.) has improved greatly. Marty Daack, 147-pounder, has had hard luck but he is expected to come imto his own. Senior John Angell did come into his own this season and leads the squad in victories. Soph Bob Engelbretson at 167 looms as a future tiger. His win against New Mexico in the teams first victory was the big tide turner. The frosh team has four or five men expected to bolster the varsity next year. All have good records from high school.

The remainder of this year will see ten of our wrestlers at the Mountain Intercollegiate Wrestling Association tournament at Bozeman, Montana on the 5th and 6th of March. Eleven or twelve teams will be competing in what should be a good "sounding board" for the NCAA's for this part of the country. Mr. Karl Kitt, coach of the squad, will be taking an as yet undetermined number of wrestlers to the NCAA's.

There will be an NCAA tournament for the fencing team too. On the road to this trorney they have compiled a 9-0 record and have been termed the strongest team ever at the Academy by coach Nick Toth. They should have disposed of Kansas this weekend to bring their record to 10-0. Two tournaments are on this season's slate- The Western Conference Championships on the 11th and 12th of March and the NCAA'S



on the 19th and 20th of the same month. At the WCC the Falcons will be out to avenge last years second place finish to UCLA after winning the tourney in the four previous years. Jock Patterson, 1964 All-American. should repeat as the Conference epee champion again this year. He is also expected to lead the team to a high finish in the NCAA's. Jock has a very good chance to improve his second place finish in last vears epee competition. A rather encouraging note is that all those fencing this year will receive letters.
