

# A Concise History of The DODO

On May 16, 1957, J. M. Reeves, Class of '59, began what he felt would become one of the outstanding campus newspapers in the nation. What he ended up with was the DODO, a weekly mimeographed newsletter and the forerunner of the only cadet magazine that matters. J. M.'s features included "The Purple Falcon" and "True Course Career" by Dave Goodrich, who later returned to U.S.A.F.A. as a Poly. Sci. instructor. There was very little humor in the DODO back then, and no girls or photographs; it was just a newsletter. Greg Hines, Class of '60, took the reins from J. M., continuing the news theme and format. Greg passed it on to Pat Wynne, Class of '61, who produced the first DODO to somewhat resemble the magazine as we know it, although there was still quite a bit of serious material. In September, 1961, Mike Regnier, Class of '63, inherited the publication and gave us the first Girl of the Month along with the first humorous covers. Mike Ditmore, also Class of '63, provided excellent artwork. Dave Samuel. Class of '64, followed Regnier, and changed the DODO into an entirely humorous magazine. Dave Connaughton, Class of '65, continued in Dave Samuel's excellent tradition before passing the magazine on to one of the DODO's most outstanding Editors, John McFalls, Class of '66. John had a rare sense of humor and introduced many new features to the DODO. Mel Green took over in 1967, and with few people to help him, the DODO almost went into hibernation. Poor artwork and poor articles followed, and by 1968, when Bill Radasky took over, the once-

mighty DODO was just a rag which had become more or less a Fifth Squadron publication. Bill did some great work, though, and when Dave Daniel joined the staff, the quality of art rose exponentially. In 1969, J. D. McBriety became Editor, and he and his staff brought the DODO back to its status as THE outstanding Wing publication. J. D. departed in 1971, and the DODO remained lively throughout the early 1970s. The 1974-75 Editor, known only as "Spooner", passed the DODO Editorship on to Karl Schricker, Class of '77. Karl published some great issues, and even printed a few pages in colored ink. Ron Stevens, also Class of '77, was the 1976-77 Editor. Then, sometime during the late 1970s, the magazine degenerated into oblivion, and remained in limbo until J. D. Seal, Class of '81, and Jim Schwindt, also Class of '81, revived the DODO and served as Co-Editors during 1979-80 and 1980-81. J. D. and Jim must be commended for their efforts in bringing back to the Wing the Official Magazine of Cadet Humor. However, their issues were sporadic and relied heavily on rehashes of old issues and mediocre humor. Stu Pope, Class of '83, became Editor in 1981 and presently continues in that capacity. Stu put the DODO back on its feet again, and, with the help of superb artist Pete Bartos, cynical cartoonist Felix Villarreal, and avant-garde thinker Pete Williams, put out some spiffy issues. The future looks promising for the publication, so help carry on the tradition and support the DODO.


people or even cadets."

greatest heights of professionalis






