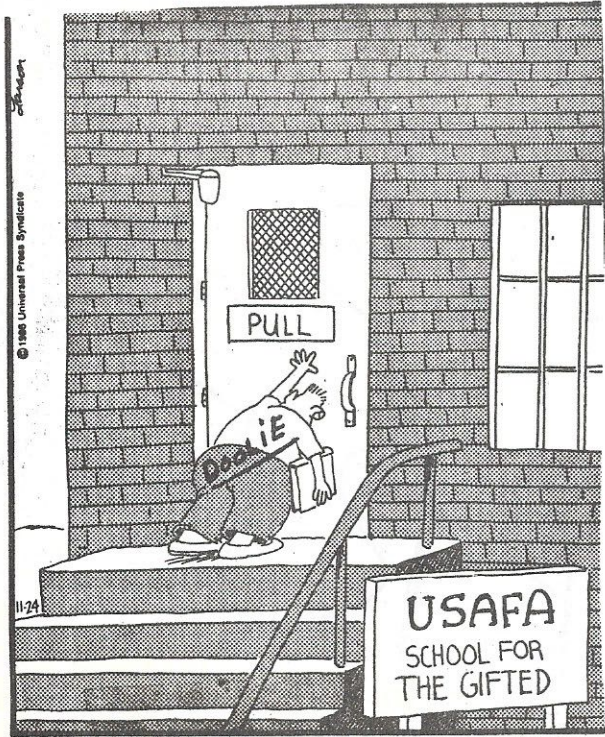

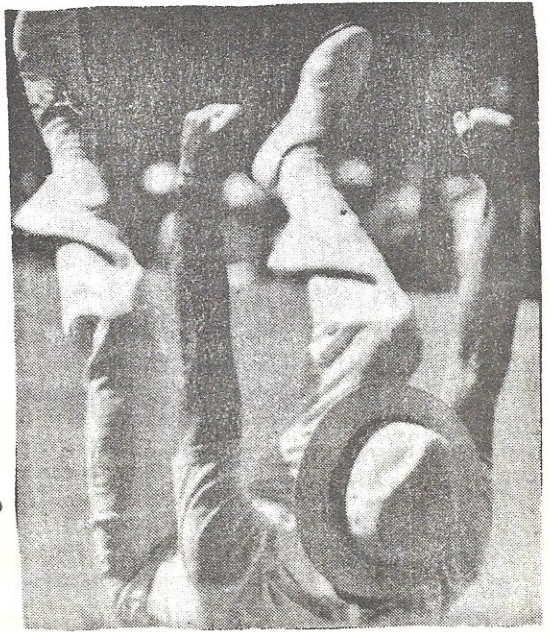

Is There Time to Sleep?  
by Cadet N. Mailer

I should perhaps call this article, "But Sir, I Have Other Courses to Study for in Addition to the Stupid and Useless Core Course you Teach."

The purpose of this synopsis is two-fold. First, for the new instructor, it is to allow him to catch a clue and face reality. Second, and most important, it should reassure all instructors that if they do demand such efforts from cadets enrolled in core courses, they will probably find those cadets comatose in class. The 2 for 1 rule is intended to be a fairy tale guideline for cadets to force them to give up their social life and extracurricular activities and develop a warped sense of priorities. For most core courses, I dare say that 2 for 1 is an absolute (and I mean absolute) farce. But for the sake of argument, let's consider the 2 for 1 a hard and fast necessity.

Scenario A is what I call the "Instructor's Dream," in other words, "Total Bull[redacted]." In this example, we see a Firstie carrying 7 course units, PMS, PE and period M5 training. Let's assume that 2 periods are totally and always tied up in PE. Also, M5 is always scheduled for training, and is never free. The Firstie is so forced into intramurals, that on intramural days, he/she/it remains on the fields all afternoon.

Cadet A's schedule equates to 3 free class periods each lesson for 2.5 lessons each week ( $\frac{1}{2}$  lesson?) On off intramural days, there are 6 hours available each week. And of course

ACQ allows  $3 \times 5 = 15$  available study hours weekly. Notice that Cadet A never takes late lights (another farce). Now remember we require 100 minutes of outside study for every 50 minutes of class. And Cadet A studies to these standards religiously. However, he/she/it never studies for PE or PMT. Also, since he is a pencil neck like some instructors who demand such cadet study time, he never takes time to exercise.

Cadet A must spend 4.83 hrs each weekend to accomplish our 2 for 1 study rule.

This time, let's be a little more realistic. Scenario B has the same schedule as Cadet A. However, Cadet B uses 3 of his/her/its 7.5 hours of free periods for the Cadet Store, Mail Room, laundry prep, etc., leaving 4.5 available daytime hours. Every off-intramural day he/she/it goes to the gym and works out for 2 hours leaving only 2 hours/week of off-intramural day available time. And to be realistic, Cadet B takes 2 hours of late lights each week.

Also to be realistic, Cadet B has a paper due for English, a Mech GR to study for, and the inevitable Aero Quiz. He/She/It also has a job in the squadron which we'll say takes an average of 2 hours of his time per day. Assuming Cadet B has all of his research done, the paper will take 3 hours. Assuming that he/she/it is also caught up in studying, about 3 hours for the GR and 1 for the quiz are needed. Added together, this accounts for 23 hours. Also, meal time and time in transport are not taken into account.



This allows the cadet 1 hour for sleeping. On the other hand, assuming that the cadet gets 6 hours of sleep (from 2400, end of late lights period, to 0600, release from night call to quarters) he must spend 35 hours each weekend (1600 Friday to 2000 Sunday) to accomplish our 2 for 1 study requirement. Fortunately for cadets, the unreasonable is not necessary.

Recall several key assumptions. First, PE only meets during half of the semester. That means there are another 2.19 more hours per week available. During intramural days, another hour is normally available if proper time management is used. That's 2 more hours per week. And let's be realistic; if Cadet B is the type who really needs the 2 for 1 study ratio, then maybe he should reconsider the 4 hours per week individual workout time--after all, PE and intramurals every other day should be enough to maintain a good bill of health. Take table tennis and golf for example. At least 1.0 to 1.5 hours/week can be recovered here. Considering these inputs, conscientious Cadet B must now spend 27 hours on the weekend to accommodate 2 for 1. It is possible. It is also possible that the cadet is a social zoid. It is also possible that if the cadet wanted to, he could go to an easy college and get an accelerated degree, go through OTS, and come back as an aero instructor/AOC.

Cadets equate to full time college students working their way through school. Civillians in this category easily spend six very full days studying and working each week. However, if the average cadet went to a civilian college, he/she/it would probably be intelligent enough to get a scholarship or grant.


And if the cadet did work, he/she/it would probably make a ██████████ lot more than we get paid here, but that's another story.

I hope that this brief synopsis helps you to wake up and smell the coffee. Those who conscientiously strive to become the best officers possible are very busy people. They are also the ones who agree that weekend study time is required. They also have never met a member of the opposite sex. For those who think that that the 2 for 1 guidance is impossible, well, they'll probably live longer and happier and have more fun in life than the type A geeks who develop ulcers at age 20 and have heart attacks at age 35.



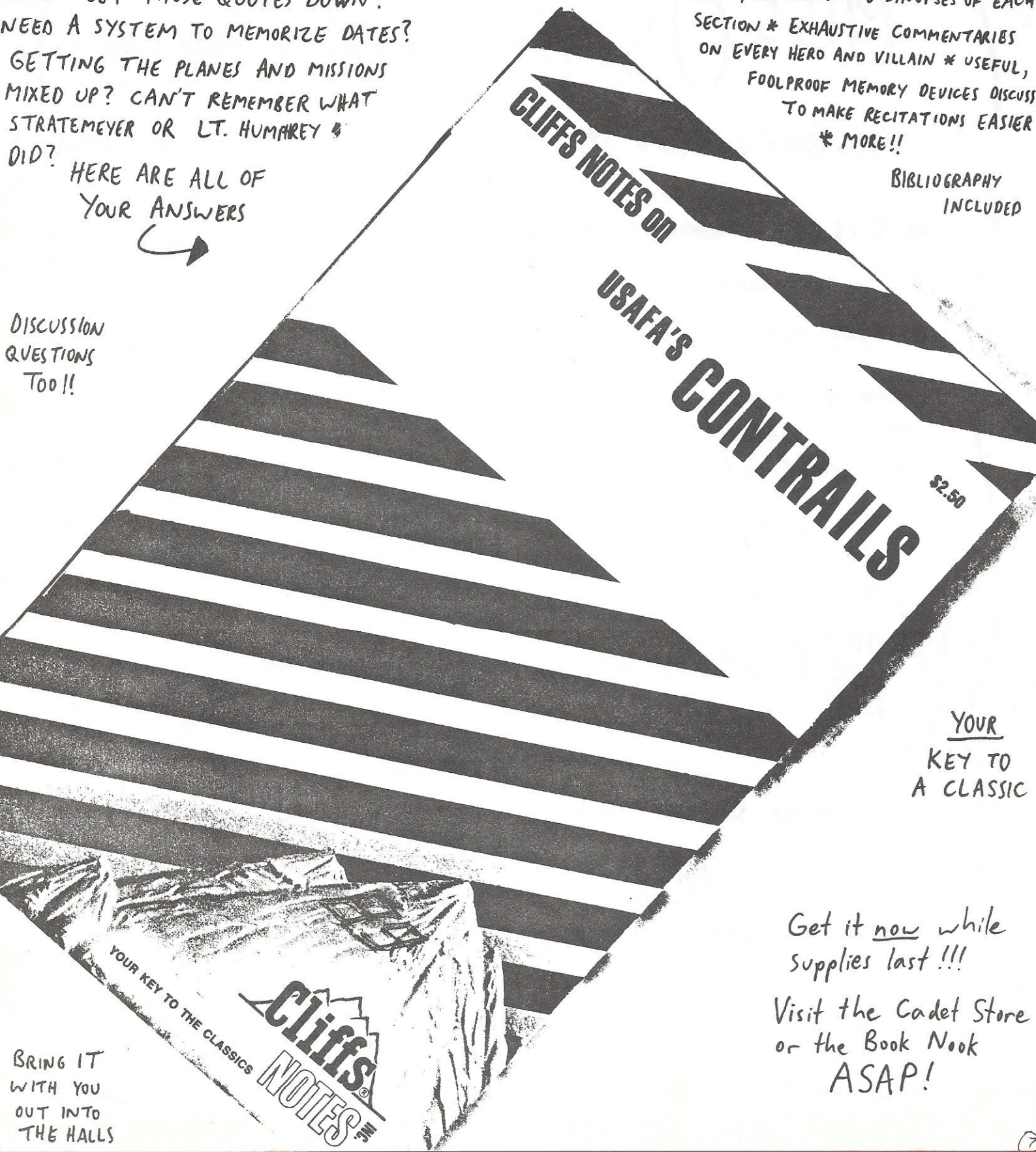

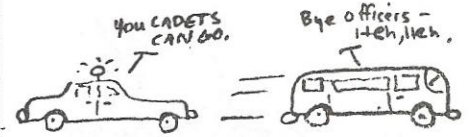


# A SPRING BREAK STORY

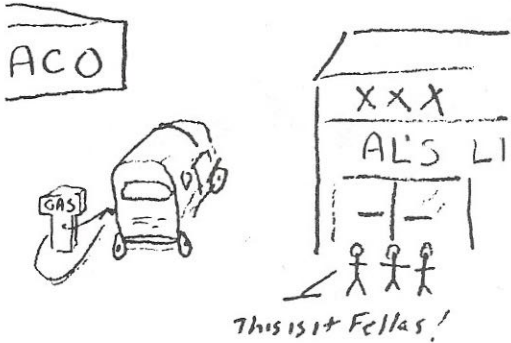
The day broke cool and clean, class got out early (EVEN EE). John, Bif and I ran to our waiting VW van and sped out of USAFA for the coast.



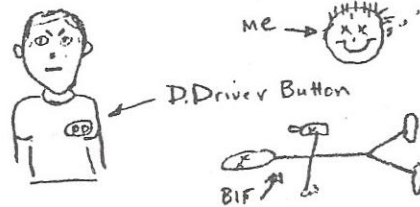

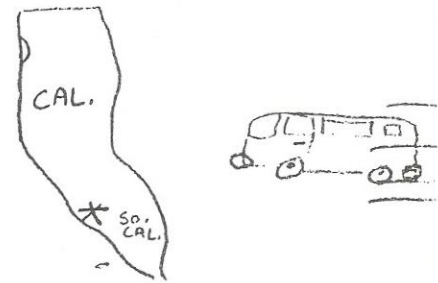
WE HAD TO STOP IN PUEBLO TO FILL THE TANK UP - THE VAN'S AND OURS. AL WAS OUR FRIEND.
